The Beauty of the Sagebrush by Louise Robinson, 1920 Reprinted from the 1917 OASIS, Volume I

We have named our school paper "The Oasis." The name might well be applied to the Boise Valley, situated as it is in the midst of the great western desert; and it might equally well be applied to the Northwest Nazarene College, here in the land of the sagebrush.

Just as God uses the water in the desert to transform the dust and sand into a beautiful garden-plot, so he is using this school as a channel to send living water to hungry, parched souls, and to change the stony barren hearts to garden plots where grow the beautiful flowers of which God only has the seeds.

To me, there is something wonderful about the desert and the sagebrush. I love to wander far out in a level stretch of gray-clad plain, until I am alone with God. Its vastness makes me think of eternity, and as the cool morning wind whispers through the branches of the straggling brush, thrilling my entire being with a strange emotion, I like to think that God is using the little shrubs as His messengers to tell the story of His undying love for me.

As the sun slowly emerges from its hiding-place and throws his golden rays across the measureless heavens, it lights up every clump of sagebrush. Every branch is bedecked with a million sparkling diamonds, and my heart cries to God, "Was ever Solomon in all his glory arrayed like one of these?" Again I stand in the same field at noonday and the June sun beats its hot rays upon my little friend, the sagebrush, but it stands erect as a soldier in battle—a soldier who has never known defeat. And I cry, "O Lord, make me like the sagebrush, unflinching, unyielding!" I look at the gnarled root and I think of the root that Isiah tells us of - "the root out of the dry ground," and which, like the sagebrush, "had neither form nor comeliness;" and like it, was despised and rejected of men."

Again, when the sun disappears from sight and his last lingering rays light up the western sky, I like to watch the blush steal over the somber grayness as His last good night kiss sets all the plain aglow. Now, it sounds as if the soft winds were singing a lullaby to the little shrubs at my feet. Presently the whole world is lost in slumber, and no sound breaks the stillness of the evening air, save the far-off call of a coyote prowling on yonder neighboring hill.

The darkening shadows close about me until I am the center of a vast, mighty dome. Then, I consider God's heavens, the work of His fingers, the moon and the stars, which He hath ordained. And I ask with the Psalmist, "What is man that thou art mindful of him? And the son of man that thou visiteth him?" Then I feel the presence of the angelic hosts, and I hear a sweet voice say, "As I was with Moses so I will be with thee; I will not fail thee, nor forsake thee."

I go home with a firmer tread and a greater determination to do His will, for my soul has received a new touch and my heart leaps for joy because the great, mighty God of the universe cares for the little sagebrush and for me.

NNC Basketball

The 1981-82 Men's Basketball Team had their ups and downs this season, but came out ahead and finished with a winning record of 17-13. Even though the Crusaders played good team ball, many team members were honored for their individual efforts.

Mike Terpstra was named to the District II All-Star Team. He also led the team in total points with 532 and rebounds with 241.

Senior Eric Forseth finished his college career playing 103 NNC games and was named to Region 7 All-American Academic Team. Eric filled an important role as team captain and his leadership was felt at all times on the court.

Daryl Crow's free throw percentage of 85.7 for the season was the highest in District II and the third best percentage in NNC history. Just behind Daryl was Dan Tristan who finished with a free throw percentage of 84.7. Tristan also ended the season with an impressive 145 assists.

The team field goal percentage of 49.3 was the highest for a season in NNC history. The Crusaders made the playoffs for the fifth consecutive year and the sixth time in seven years since Terry Layton has been head coach.

Tracksters set six new records

The women's track team sprinted to a super season breaking six school records and coming home from Nationals with a first place. The 4 x 100 relay team of Robin Johnson, Kellie Bohannon, Shana Galloway, and Antonette Blythe turned the circuit during semi-finals at 48.7 seconds and went on to win Nationals. For their efforts this year, they became All-Americans - the most All-Americans on a NNC sports team at any one time in school history.

Antonette Blythe broke NNC records in the 100 meters at 12.07, and in the long jump. She broke her own long jump record by better than a foot at 19'2. At Nationals she took second in the 100 meters.

Johnson, Galloway, Bohannon, and Lorry Wirth broke the 4x400 meter relay record by setting a time of 4:08.3.

Team captain Robin Johnson, running the event for the first time during the season broke the mark in the 200 meters by recording a time of 25.76.

Freshman Sandy Early set the other school record in the discus by throwing a 129 foot effort.

Antonette Blythe was awarded Most Valuable while Shana Galloway was considered Most Improved on the team. Kellie Bohannon was honored as Most Inspirational.
