McCarthy Vs. Army

Though Republican Senator Joseph McCarthy has been strongly opposed to Army Secretary Robert Stevens, President Eisenhower at his new conference said he was backing Stevens "to the limit." One of the most sensational debates of the year has been in progress between the Army and Sen-Linda Sue Bybe brought joy to ator McCarthy. Recently the Army named twenty-nine accusations in a row with the senator.

President Eisenhower said the controversy has caused the nation to suffer a loss of international prestige and national self respect. Eisenhower asserted our only hope now is that America may derive from the incident advantages that are at least comparable to the damage already done. 
