

Security suspension causes stir

This past Friday morning a group of students comprised of four security officer and one Corlett P.A. gathered outside the offices of Student Development.

At issue was the apparent dismissal of Matthew Lindley, student head of security on the NNC campus.

On Saturday, April 12, Lindley used the security keys to enter a Corlett dorm room in order to play a practical joke.

Afterwards, Lindley was approached by Corlett resident director Brenda Wilkes.

"She asked if I took the key. I said yes. She said that she

would have to tell my employer," says Lindley. Lindley then proceeded to call his employer, Willy Taylor, chief of security, and explained the situation. According to Lindley, Taylor said it was "no big deal."

Wilkes refused to talk with The Crusader concerning the situation.

On Monday night, April 28 Taylor approached Lindley and informed him that he would have to be let go.

Much confusion ensued as to whether Lindley was fired, suspended, or something else entirely.

As Lindley informed friends and co-workers, a small cadre formed that felt that Lindley may have been wrongfully terminated, which led to the group of students outside of Student Development, all ready to resign their positions if a satisfactory explanation or compromise couldn't be found between Lindley and Ken Hills, Vice President of Student Development (which is in charge of campus security).

As a result of that meeting it was discovered that Lindley, in fact, was not fired, merely suspended for a term The confusion arose because Lindley's senior status means that his suspension will end well after graduation.

"As far as I'm conerned, Matt wasn't fired," said Hills. "The issue is credibility, is trust....By virtue of the title, "security" we need to be able to feel secure."

Justify Your Job: Dale Van Hooser

Director of Administrative Computing: the title is more comprehensive than it may sound. Dale Van Hooser has held this position, which includes duties from managing the computer help desk, to assisting as needed

with special hardware setups during RAD and registration, since 1986.

fore joining the **NNC Adminis**trative team, Van Hooser was a private consultant with his own firm. Van Hooser was born in Nampa, Idaho. Though Van Hooser is a graduate of the University of Idaho and Boise

State University, his wife is a graduate of NNC and both of his children are attending NNC.

Van Hooser heard about this Administrative position at NNC from Professor Lloyd Thorpe. So what made Van Hooser decide to come to NNC, leaving behind the consulting firm he had helped to found? "I've belonged to College Church since 1972, and my friends worked here and ... I was tired of being on the road, being out of town, this type of thing ... I just wanted to be closer to home."

Van Hooser had made many changes during his occupation of this position. One area that he has vastly affected is the budget for his office; in his 11 years here, his budget has decreased by half. This money has been channeled into the academic side.


The current system that NNC uses is in-house written. "I have either written, or currently maintain, all of the software the college uses administratively: everything from financial aid ... to the grades that the registrar puts in ... I write the programs, I fix the programs, I change the programs." Van Hooser even wrote the program that registers

> our student ID numbers in the computer at Marriott.

Most of our sister colleges buy packages for use in their schools for the price of half a million to three million dollars. Writing our own "packages" has saved the school quite a bit of money.

A typical day for Van

Hooser begins at Environmental Services, where he starts their morning coffee and his day grows exponetially less typical from there. Van Hooser can usually be reached in his office throughout the day, from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. "I get calls when I want to take a Sunday afternoon nap ... students have systems go down and they need something fixed ... Some of the major systems, in order to work on them they have to be done when people aren't working on them at all, so we come in at 2:00 in the morning." Van Hooser, during "normal" working hours, works from a work request system. "Departments request the work to be done, giving some description of it so I can get some idea and some estimates about how long it will take."

The meaning of Cinco de Mayo

After Mexico won its independence from Spain in 1821, it faced internal power struggles that left it in a confusing and volatile state of rebellion and instability for years. The southern parts of the new "Mexican Empire" broke off to form the present Centeral American republics, while the northern half of the territory was lost to the United States. Mexico was invaded by the U.S., Spain, and France.

The second French invastion began in 1861, during the administration of the national hero Benito Juarez. Mexican guerilla forces, determined to protect their capitol, decided to make their stand de-

fending the strategic town of Puebla. On May 5, 1862, outgunned and outnumbered over two to one, these untrained forces successfully defended their positions, then attacked and scattered the French troops, achieing a total victory over soldiers deemed among the best trained and equipped in the world. The following year, however, the French went on to capture Puebla and ruled Mexico until 1867.

Cinco de Mayo, therefore, does not celebrate Mexico's independence nor does it commemorate a successful war. But it is important to Mexico and to Latin America in general for three

3) In the larger sense, Cinco de Mayo symbolizes the right of people to self determination and national sovereignty, and the ability of non-Europeans to defend those rights against modern military orginizations.

When we study Cinco de Mayo, we should relate this history to the whole saga of European colonialism since 1492. We must challenge our-

selves and our students to look critically at conventional versions of the Columbus story (and Thanksgiving Day). We must understand that the Americas, as well as Asia and Africa, produced advanced civilizations and highly

sophisticated cultures which were relentlessly exploited and often obliterated by European invaders. It is also imprtant to keep in mind that all peoples develop cultures worthy of study and respect, not just those who build cities of stone.

Finally, we must examine the net results of cultural contact and the mingling of peoples. No matter how cruel the history and how devestating the consequences, even today, the human genius for survival and creativity results in stories of resistance, cultural continuity, and the emergence of new cultures and peoples that enrich our world.

These words were written shortly before May 5th, 1862:

Benito Juarez, president of

Mexico, in a proclamation to the Mexican people:

"The government of the republic will fulfill its duty to defend its

independence, to repel foreign aggression, and accept the struggle to which it has been provoked, counting on the unanimous spirit of the Mexicans and on the fact that sooner or later

the cause of rights and justice will triumph."

General Lorencez, French Commander of the invasion forces, to his government:

"We are so superior to the Mexicans in race, in organization, in discipline, in morality, and in refinement of sensibilities, that as of this moment, at the head of our 6,000 valient soldiers, I am the master of Mexico."

Seniors in science & math dept. present research

Senior symposium held for science research presentations

Thirty-three graduating seniors in the science divison presented research projects at the Senior Seminar

in the Wiley building on Saturday. The seniors put hundreds of hours of research into topics that were chosen, in many cases, before the senior year even began.

The Senior Seminar is a graduation requirement for all graduates of the science divison. "It's basically a part of the senior thesis, which requires an oral and writ- senior thesis..." ten presentation," said Dr. Francis Sharpton, a physics professor. "It can be on any topic relating to the major, as long as it's accepted by a faculty member."

The seminar covered a variety of topics. McDougall, who is majoring in mathematics, statistically analyzed the effectiveness of Relief Pitching in Major League Baseball. By analyzing the sea-

son stats of thirteen pitchers from around the league, he came to the conclusion that starting pitchers were still effective in the seventh and eighth innings and didn't need to be replaced by a middle reliever in most cases.


Paul Edmonds compared neuromelanin from the Canadian nightcrawler, Lumbricus, with that from the human brain. Parkinson's disease destroys neurons associated with this

> neuromelanin. Edmonds concluded that the melanins were indeed similar, and that the worm's neural net could be used as an animal model in Parkinson's disease research.

Computer science major Joshua Nalley led a group project to develop a multi-user domain (MUD) which would work over the Internet. A MUD is basically a text adventure game in which players interact with each other in real time over the Internet. Nally began

working on the MUD the summer before his junior year, meeting with a group every week for three to six hours. "We're still putting some finishing touches on it, but it should be up and running in three to four months," he said.

Physics major Dave Zink's project was to build a system that would detect solar flares. Zink detected several flares using a system which analyzed the signal strength of VLF (Very Low Frequency) waves. Since he began working on the project third term of his freshman year, Zink estimated that five to ten flares were detected. "It only detects the two largest classes of flares," he said. "Each month we send in our findings to the American Assn. of Variable Star Observers, who publish a list of solar flares." This list can be used by others in solar flare research.

The worst movie ever

Am I allowed to give a movie zero stars? I'm quite sure that I've seen quite a few movies that were a lot worse. Those movies, though, had their amazingly dismal scripts and acting going for them. They were so bad, they were almost fun to watch.

Warriors of Virtue has noth-

ing going for it. It isn't that the acting is completely atrocious, or that the effects are terrible, or that the premise is stupid, it is just that it has all been done before, and when it was done before, it was done better ... much better.

For instance, the beginning of the movie is very Disney-Channel-movie-of-theweek. A crippled young boy helps his football team win the

big game by calling the winning play, for which, of course, he gets no praise. The team quarterback (ordered straight from ACME's "Movie Jerk in a Box" kit) takes this opportunity to invite Ryan (our hero) into his gang so that he can have someone new to pick on.

In the course of things, Ryan gets yanked into an alternate reality (a la *The Never Ending Story*, among others) where ONLY HE can save the world.

Okay, so far I'm content. Nothing original so far, but nothing dismally stupid either. I figure that all the creativity and imagination went into this fantasy world and I had something Never Ending Story-ish coming along. (I really, really liked The Never Ending Story, by the way.)

I was wrong. Instead of a rich fantasy world with really creative creatures and locals, I got *The Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles*. No joke. The Warriors of Virtue are five kangaroos. Each Warrior had a different virtue, such as benevolence, high wisdom, and some other garbage, none of which had anything to do with the movie.

Continuing on, the audience

was introduced to Komodo, the evil warlord who was mining all of the "life springs" for some mineral which Komodo needed to live in order to keep himself eternally young. Unfortunately, both for Kimodo and for the people of Tao (the name of the fantasy world), there is only one life spring left.

It's a good thing that Ryan showed up with the Manuscript of Tao. According to legend, the manuscript would do something that would allow Komodo to go to earth, where, of course, he plans on mining all of our life springs so that he can continue to be young (course, if he'd just bothered asking he could have saved himself a lot of trouble, being as we don't

have any life springs).

So, a bunch of stuff happens, none of which really matters or is at all amusing to watch, or even make fun of, and then the end of the movie comes along.

After some mildly amusing battle scenes, Master Chung (some wise old guy that died about halfway through the movie) sends a message to Ryan about believing in himself, allowing Ryan to read the manuscript, which, remember, is the secret to everything, and says something amazingly stupid about the "five becoming one" and the taking of a life as draining to a person.

Have I got a treat for you music lovers. If you like Jars of Clay or Nouveaux, you will probably like the group that I have to review for you all today. This new five-member group calls itself *Smalltown*

Poets and these guys have a great sound and a solid message.

The group is comprised of Michael Johnston, lead vocals and guitars; Danny Stephens, keyboards; Byron Goggin, drums; Miguel Dejesus, bass guitar; and Kevin Breuner, guitars. This album was produced by Dana Key, formerly of Degarmo and Key.

The first thing you should do when you get this album is quickly get it into your stereo. The guitar work on this album is very good with some very nice guitar licks in every song. These guys balance out the use of electric guitars and acoustic guitars quite nicely. The drum work on this album is solid and provides a great base that the guys build nicely off of. The keyboard use is also well done and doesn't dominate the music. All together, the sound is foot stomping good and will grab your attention.

The next thing that you should do after the CD begins to play in your stereo or Discman is grab the cover out of the sleeve and check out the lyrics. The album has some very cool lyrics. 
And that's terrific. Having that kind of tradition to draw on -- while being able to observe the radical transformation in human perception of God -- is an inestimable privilege.

We disagree. The old, in this particular case Chapman Hall, may not be the best and the brightest, but it is very much worth quite a bit, perhaps not as a building, but as a way of life through which the great majority of NNC men have been introduced to the college experience.

So, with this final collection of stories and memories, we wish our old friend Chapman, both the building and the culture, a respectful goodbye.

In the beginning...

Chapman Hall was built in 1947 (named after General Superintendent James B. Chapman). According to the book *From Sagebrush to Ivy*, construction was complicated by the lack of materials caused by the war effort.

"There are many stories of the strain of trying to find lumber, bricks, nails, paint, doors, locks and keys, and more, during the war years when everything seemed to be in short supply or already allocated someplace else under endless government regulations."

The early years

In 1950, Northwest Nazarene College was a little bit different than it is today.

For instance, the campus had both an elementary school and a high school. Many of the men in the high school lived in the basement of Chapman

Dr. Ken Hills of the Office of Student Development, tells us that, during the week that the college students had finals, the high school kids used to come through and turn off all of the lights.

out an NNC woman, drop her off at curfew, and then go out with a girl from Albertson.

The freshman class of 1981 accomplished one of the most spectacular pranks ever achieved at Northwest Nazarene College. The Chapman Playboy Bunny.

Late night, just before Regional Activity Days is set to begin, a number of freshman gather on the forbidden roof of Chapman Hall armed with water-based white spray paint and a cardboard template of the Playboy Bunny.

They hang the template over the side of the building and spray paint the bunny on the bricks just above the doors to Chapman hall.


Remember, it is the night before R.A.D.


have a never-ending supply of stories. Some are not publishable, but a vast majority of them are.

This story revolves around the often fascinating interaction between Chapman residents and their Morrison counterparts. The guys, being NNC freshmen, had been made well


aware that tradition dictates that one identify first-year females with large udder-bearing, milk-producing farm animals.

Rebels prepare to take Zaire's capitol

KINSHASA, ZAIRE -- The Zairian rebels seemed to be ready Monday for a final attack on the capital of President Mobutu Sese Seko. This was the result after the dictator and rebel leaders failed to reach any agreements during the weekend peace talks.

Only after seven months of civil war, the leader of the rebels, Laurent Kabila, currently controls three-fourths of Zaire and commands 70,000 troops. Monday, Mobutu was demanded, by Kabila, to hand over his power to Kabila.

Kabila promised to remove Mobutu from the capital in a humiliating defeat if the demand was not

During the talks on Sunday, Mobutu insisted that power would only be handed over through an elected government.

From the talks, Kabila claimed that his rebel movement, the Alliance of Democratic Forces for the Liberation of Congo-Zaire, was ready to enter Kinshasa within two or three days.

The South African President, Nelson, Mandela, took part in the effort to get somewhere with the peace talks as well. He hopes to get a new meeting going within in eight to ten days to hopefully "narrow the gap between the two parties." Though a date and time has not been set, South African officials stated mediators would work in the next few days on a way for Mobutu to give power over to a transitional author-

"If Mobutu hands over power before we enter Kinshasa, I will guarantee his safety and that of his biological family. But if he does not, we will have to chase him away in humiliation," Kabila told a news con-

As of Monday Kabila's rebel forces were said to be about 40 miles from Kinshasa's airport and were only days away from entering the capital.

As of Tuesday, during his vow to defend the Zairian capital against a rebel advance, Mobutu packed his bags to leave Zaire for what an aide claimed would be a three-day visit to neighboring Gabon. It is not yet clear as to if Mobutu will be able to make the return. Confirmations were made that rebel troops are within 40 miles of Kinshasa. Scouts were already there gathering intelligence. Kabila is planning to take out Kinshasa's airport and guessed his forces will be at the outskirts of the city within days.

Today Mobutu plans to depart the country on his private jet, and plans to meet with leaders of Cameroon, Central African Republic, Gabon, Togo and Congo, who all strongly support the Zairian leader.

Zaire's information minister, Kin-Kiey Mulumba, denies all reports that claim that Mobutu is going into exile and claims he will return to Kinshasa. "This meeting was planned before the summit. Mobutu has a schedule to keep."

Kinshasa supposedly launched a counter attack and was driving back the rebels forces as of Tuesday, although there is no confirmation of the report.

South African officials state that Kabila had assured them that he will stop his troops from advancing for eight days in order to give the two rivals enough time to meet again for scheduled peace talks. On the ground, signs are little that Kabila is sticking to his word. The rebel commanders are plotting a two pronged advance from the two cities captured by rebels over the weekend.

"Our main task is to protect the population against the extremists, against looting and against violence," rebel spokesman Ghenda said. "We will target only military installations in the city."

Pamphlets have been distributed stating that rebels are in the city and appealing for civilians to wear armbands or headbands "to salute the liberation of Kinshasa."

As the west prepares for the "endgame", British troops trained on the Congolese side of the river for a rescue mission of the citizens, should they be endangered by fighting in the Zairian capital.

The U.S. State Department said that special envoy Bill Richardson will fly to Paris today to talk with France about the "endgame" in Zaire. "We want to make sure we're coordinating with the French during the endgame in Zaire.

Charlton Heston takes NRA position

72-year-old actor expected to bring peace to declining National Rifle Associtaion

SEATTLE, WA -- The newly elected member of the Board of Directors of the National Rifle Association (NRA), Charlton Heston, is now a candidate to remove the leading critic of Executive Vice-President Wayne LaPierre, Jr.

The 72-year-old actor's spokesman, Tony Makris, stated that Heston has discussed a bid for the vicepresidency currently held by Neal Knox.

In the midst of declining membership and fewer revenues, Knox has been highly critical of LaPierre's leadership since he was hired in 1991. NRA membership has declined from 3.5 million in 1995 to 2.8 million this year. The group has proven to be one of the strongest political lobbying groups in Wash-

Heston was elected to the board on Sunday night after winning 74 percent of the 1,410 ballots cast, beating out 157 other contenders for a single position on the 76-member board. The other members of the board were chosen by a mail-in ballot that NRA members completed.

Knox, formerly a chief political lobbyist for the group and his cohorts, have accused LaPierre of mismanagement, over-spending and violation of board policies since taking the office. LaPierre denies all charges. Knox stated that he learned Sunday night of the possible challenge by Heston.

Heston has chosen Kayne Robinson, a deputy police chief from Des Moines, Iowa, as his running mate. Robinson would be in a position to unseat 2nd vice-president Albert Ross.

LaPierre commented that it would not surprise him if there were any challenges to Knox, but he declined any comment on where he thought that challenge would come from.

Editor's Note: As of the writing of this article several changes have occured that should be mentioned here.

Monday's election has given the vice presidency to Heston. No official statements have been made by any parties but there is a general feeling though out the organization that the change will lead to more cooperation and an end too much of the bickering that has plagued the NRA in recent years. Kayne Robinson has taken the 2nd vice president position.

Labour Party sweeps **House of Commons**

Scotsmen appointed by Prime Minister to four key positions in U.K. government

London, England -- The possibilities are high that Scotland and Wales will soon receive their own legislatures after the dramatic election of last Thursday. Britain's Labour party has taken control of Parliament. The Conservative party that formerly held it is afraid that separate legislatures could spell the end of the United Kingdom.

The Conservatives, the loud-

est, and nearly the only opposition to the new national assemblies, were wiped completely out of Scotland and Wales. Labour, on Tony Blair's cabinet the other hand, controls most districts within the two, along

with an impossible stronghold in the House of Commons, and plans to institute referendums for the assemblies as

The only non-Labour legislators to take office are either liberal Democrats that follow the Labour line, or independence-seeking nationalists.

Four major positions within new Prime Minister Tony Blair's cabinet are held by Scots: treasury chief, foreign secretary, Scottish secretary and top judicial officer.

It is argued by many of the losers, including one Michael Forsyth (who incidentally lost to a Scot), that a Scottish Parliament will be the first step toward the ruin and dissolution of the United Kingdom. Voters have been unimpressed by this extreme view. Most Scots and Welsh voted Labour while the English electorate, that comprises eighty percent of the vote, cares little about the

> There are still serious questions that are being raised by the issue. One is whether the 129-member Parliament in Edinburgh will have tax-raising powers. This is not a priority for the

Welsh, who are more integrated with England than the Scots. The Scots have kept separate educational and legal systems after 300 years of political union with England. This situation would cause the oddity of Scottish legislators voting on English educational systems in the House of Commons, while the English legislator would not have the same privilege with the Scottish.

FDR Memorial dedicated amid conflict

On May 2, the memorial to President Franklin Delano Roosevelt was dedicated by President Clinton, but not without controversy.

The dedication might have been horribly disrupted by protestors from disabled groups had President Clinton not agreed to ask Congress to add a statue

to the monument which portrays President Roosevelt in a wheel chair. For along time it was debated whether this great President of the United States should be portrayed standing or seated in a wheel chair.

As a young man,

FDR was stricken with polio and paralyzed from the waist down. Organizations representing the disabled insist he ought to be depicted in a wheelchair, while many other people feel that the seated statue of President Roosevelt fails to portray his radiant, jaunty self-

confidence that was as much a part of his curative message to the nation as his policies and programs were.

In addition to at least one statue of FDR, the 7.5 acre memorial includes several other statues and spans the area between Washington's Cherry Tree walk, and a road that runs parallel to the Potomac River.

Life-sized bronze statues done by George Segal represent the hope and the despair of the Great Depression. The statues depict a number of men standing in a breadline, and a solitary man listening to a

radio--to one of FDR's Fireside Chats. This set of statues commemorates the hope and encouragement FDR brought to that time through his New Deal policies, which brought this country up out of the Depression.

There is also a statue of Eleanor Roosevelt, whom President Clinton called FDR's "magnificent" partner. Interestingly enough, Eleanor Roosevelt has been depicted without the boa fur she often wore around her neck.






Crusader Volleyball Club competes in league tournament

Only six members of the sometimes 30-member men's volleyball club traveled to Walla Walla, Washington: junior Chris Hunt, freshman hitter Ben Schafer, freshman Kevin Chittenden, NNC Alumnus

Ben Kneadler, senior Dallas McKellips, and senior Karl Ganske. The team's first match of two games was played on Saturday, against Multnomah School of the Bible. They lost the match 0-2. Next, they played Eastern Oregon University, on the same day, and split that match. Sunday, they played Boise State University, losing 0-2, then Walla Walla USA, whom they beat 2-0, and then Walla Walla College, to whom they lost 0-2. Later that day, they played Multnomah once again, this time for third or fourth place standing in the tournament. It was a best three-of-five match. The 'Saders, unfortunately, won only one game and lost the rest.

Two team members were voted to a twelve member All Tournament Team. McKellips and Hunt were both selected for this honor. Said Ganske, "We had a real good team effort, but those two really came through for us."

Two teams forfeited to the Crusaders during the season, and the 'Saders came away with a 2-6 record for the regular season. The Crusaders even got to scrimmage against a USVBA team from Boise twice, which Ganske and the other players saw as a learning experience. Ganske and the team hope that next year, the experience the team gained this year will help them gain more, and improve their record and their play.

Ganske saw this year of play as one of improvement for the relatively young team. Many players improved their performance, and many of the freshmen earned a feel for college volleyball. Ganske, as this year's club president, has many plans for next year. "I'm real excited about next year because we should have a bigger program with more players, more sponsers and more games."

Ganske already has four tournaments planned for next year's team, as well as several regular season games. Eastern Oregon State College is hosting a tournament in March, in April there is a tournament in Portland and NNC will be hosting two tournaments, also in April. The final

Ganske is also working on a home page for the team, in part to begin a heavy recruiting compaign for more sponsors. The team is also looking for a statistician and a manager for next year. 

"Nah . . . I finally wore down his resistance. I got him right where I wanted him."


"Yeah, right. You've told that story before."
