### JULY 25, 1951 IMPORTANT DATE All Veteran trainees who have

been out of service as much as four years by July 25, 1951, must remain in continous training after that date or they will forfeit any portion of their entitlement that they may have left. Veterans who have been out of service for as much as four years and have not started using their entitlement for any kind of training must begin their training on or before July 25, 1951, or forfeit all of their entitlement for training.

As far as I know there is only one exception to the above. In case a veteran is a full time teacher during the regular school year, he may use his remaining entitlement for graduate work during the summer term and interrupt his training for the regular school year.
